Your doctor may require additional immunizations to meet your child's individual health care needs.

Range of Recommended Ages
 Certain High-Risks Groups

- 1. Pneumococcal (PCV)/(PPSV)** - Minimum age: 6 weeks for pneumococcal conjugate vaccine (PCV); 2 years for pneumococcal polysaccharide vaccine (PPSV).
- 2. Influenza** - Administer annually to children aged 6 months through 18 years.
- 3. HepA (2-dose series)** - Ask your child's doctor when to have each dose administered.
- 4. HPV (3-dose series)** - Ask your child's doctor when to have each dose administered.
